Financial Assistance Grants Restore the quantum of Financial Assistance Grants to at least 1% of Commonwealth Taxation	In 2022-23 the Australian Government will provide \$2.804B [\$2,652B in 2021-22] in Financial Assistance Grants funding. This includes \$2.1B [\$1.3B in 2021-22] which will be brought forward from the 2022-23 estimate and paid to States and Territory Governments in 2021-22. The remainder is \$704.4M in 2022-23 [\$1.3B in 2021-22]. (BP3 P97)	In 2022-23 the Australian Government will provide \$2.921B [\$2,652B in 2021-22] in Financial Assistance Grants funding. This includes \$2.1B [\$1.3B in 2021-22] which was brought forward from the 2022-23 estimate and paid to States and Territory Governments in 2021-22. The remainder is \$821.5M in 2022-23 [\$1.3B in 2021-22]. (BP3 P97)

Discontinued Coalition Programs

- **Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF)** the BBRF will be discontinued and no further funding will be available. All contracted projects from Rounds 1-5 will be honoured. Round 6 will not proceed. Applicants who applied for funding under Round 6 of the BBRF are being notified of the program's status and will be able to apply to the Growing Regions Program. For further information, please contact the Business Grants Hub on 13 28 46. (email advice from the Department)
- Community Development Grants Programme (CDG) the CDG will close. Applicants with approved but as yet uncontracted CDG projects will have 6 months to contract their project and then complete by 30 June 2026. Commitments announced by the former Government during the 2022 Pre-Election Economic and Fiscal Outlook will be delivered through new election commitment programs. (email advice from Department)
